New Zealand, a parliamentary state located in the Southwest Pacific 1,250 miles (2,011 km.) east of Australia, has an area of 103,883 sq. mi. (268,680 sq. km.) and a population of \*3.4 million. Capital: Wellington. Wool, meat, dairy products and some manufactured

items are exported.

The first European to sight New Zealand was the Dutch navigator Abel Tasman in 1642. The islands were explored by British navigator Capt. James Cook who surveyed it in 1769 and annexed the land to Great Britain. The British government disavowed the annexation and for the next 70 years the only white settlers to arrive were adventurers attracted by the prospects of lumbering, sealing and whaling. Great Britain annexed the land in 1840 by treaty with the native chiefs and made it a dependency of New South Wales. The colony was granted self-government in 1852, a ministerial form of government in 1856, and full dominion status on Sept. 26. 1907. Full internal and external autonomy, which New Zealand had in effect possessed for many years. was formally extended in 1947. New Zealand is a member of the Commonwealth of Nations. The Queen of England is Head of State as Queen of New Zealand.

Prior to 1933 English coins were the official legal tender but Australian coins were accepted in small transactions. Currency fluctuations caused a distintive New Zealand coinage to be introduced in 1933. The 1935 Waltangl crown and proof set were originally intended to mark the introduction but delays caused their date to be changed to 1935. The 1940 halfcrown marked the centennial of British rule, the 1949 and 1953 crowns commemorated Royal visits and the 1953 proof set marked the coronation of Queen Elizabeth.

Decimal Currency was introduced in 1967 with special sets commemorating the last issued of pound sterling (1965) and the first of the decimal issues. Since then dollars and set of coins have been issued nearly every year.

# Stokes & Son, Medal Makers, Melbourne, Victoria & Sydney, New South Wales

Thomas Stokes was born in Edgeburston, Birmingham, England, in 1831. He was apprenticed to a diesinker, and migrated to Australia in search of gold in the 1850s. He did not succeed, but returned to his trade as a diesinker and button maker. In 1856 he established a successful business at 15 Mincing Lane, Melbourne, and soon moved to larger permises at 115 Flinders Lane.

In 1857 Stokes acquired a press from W.J. Taylor and began to mint large numbers of tradesmen's tokens, some 82 varieties in all (this has more recently been contested). He also commenced the Australian Medallic Issues. Within a short time the business moved again, to 100 Collins Street. In 1873 Stokes took a partner, Martin, and the business was re-named Stokes & Martin. It added silverware to its product line, but the new direction was not well received. The business relocated to 29 Little Collins Street, where in 1893 a disastrous fire damaged a large portion of the business. Unfortunately Martin had forgotten to renew the fire insurance policy, and the partnership was dissolved as a result. Stokes rebuilt the business as Stokes & Son.

The business became a proprietary concern in 1911, re-named Stokes & Son Pty Ltd. Its medals ceased being artistically significant, atthough remained technically sound. It began to focus on mass-produced medals at competitive prices, rapidly produced with insufficient time to develop artistic designs.

In 1935 the business moved to Albert Street, Brunswick, and in 1962 Stokes became a public company, renamed Stokes (Australasia) Pty Ltd. Today [2005] the business is located in Ringwood.

### W.J. Taylor, Mint, London, United Kingdom

William Joseph Taylor was born in Birmingham in 1802. By the 1840s Taylor was established as a medallist and dealer. During his career he produced a considerable number of coins and tokens, mainly for export.

In 1848 Taylor acquired many of the original dies from the Soho mint, from which he restruck many of the earlier Soho coins, including patterns. He usually repolished and re-engraved some elements of the original die before reusing them.

Taylor sent a press to Australia in November 1852 as part of the unsucessful Kangaroo Office venture. Although the press was already old, Kangaroo Office Manager Reginald Scalle was nevertheless was able to use it to produce four pieces that were awarded a bronze prize at the Melbourne Exhibition in 1854. The dies for these had been prepared in London. Thomas Stokes purchased the press from the Kangaroo Office when the business was wound up in 1857. For further details, see records for: 'Kangaroo Office (Mint)'; 'Scalle, Reginald'; and 'Stokes, Thomas'.

Taylor retained links to Melbourne in later years. In 1860 and 1862 Coard, a London agent for some Victorian businesses, gave Taylor orders for tokens to be issued by two Melbourne businesses, John Andrew and his neighbour A.G. Hodgson (see parties records). He also struck tokens for a number of New Zealand businesses.

Taylor is named as the maker of the Melbourne Regatta prize medal issued in 1868, 1888 and a Victorian Rifle Association medal (undated). Examples of these medals are held in the Museum Victoria collection.

Taylor died in 1885.

### Heaton & Sons Mint, Birmingham, England

Heaton and Sons is one of the longest running and most prolific private mints in the world. The company began as a family business in Birmingham, then a booming metal working centre, pioneering the mass production techniques of the industrial revolution. In 1794 Ralph Heaton I established a brassfounding business in Staney Street, Birmingham. From 1808-1812 the company moved to Shadwell Street. During that time Heaton's son Ralph Heaton II became apprenticed to Thomas Willetts as a die maker.

By 1817 Ralph I gave Ralph II a tenement and shop at the corner of Bath Street and Shadwell Street. Although the two men shared an address, they separately administered their businesses. 1817 marks the birth of the business in question, which endured for nearly two centuries. In 1847 Ralph II's business became Heaton and Son, when Ralph III joined his father. In 1853 the business became Heaton and Sons when George began with them. This name was retained until 1889.

In 1850 Ralph II purchased equipment from the wound-up Soho Mint, also of Birmingham. The equipment was moved to the Bath Street premises. The first issue from the mint was the 1851 Annand Smith (Sydney, New South Wales) penny token.

Between 1850 and 1875 Heaton and Sons struck at least two Australasian tokens; the above, and one Iredale & Co. token both bear their "H" mintmark. Andrews ascribes 17 Australasian tokens to Heaton and Sons, based on similarities of design and manufacture to the Iredale & Co. token. A total of 25 tokens are ascribed to the company by J.O. Sweeny, but he suggests that more tokens may have been struck from dies made by Heaton and Sons or that both the dies and tokens for a larger number were made by the company (Sweeny, J.O., A Numismatic History of the Birmingham Mint, Birmingham, 1981, Appendix VI: Australiasian Tokens, pp.240-245).

In 1851 Heaton and Son began producing currency for the Royal Mint, and for other nations, making coins in various denominations for the Republic of Chile. From this time forward the production of coins for export became an important, if not the most important, part of their activities. In 1860 a site was purchased in Icknield Street, Birmingham; the business relocated there two years later. The proprietorship of another generation, Ralph Heaton III, then began.

In 1887 Heaton and Sons won a contract to build and equip the Canton Mint. Two years later, on 22 March 1889, the company became a limited liability company. The company name was changed from Heaton and Sons to "The Mint Birmingham Limited". Ralph Heaton III retired with the proviso that his son, Ralph Heaton IV, be taken on as General Manager. Heaton III died in 1891.

In 1911-1912 the Birmingham Mint lost its monopoly with Royal Mint coinage. Henceforth it had to share contracts with Kings Norton Metal Company, which in 1918 became part of Nobel Industries. Between 1910-1915 several Australian bronze and silver coins bore the "H" for Heaton mintmark. These include Australian silver shillings dated 1910-1915. In 1919 the company made its last issue with Heaton "H" mark.

Ralph Heaton IV retired in 1920. Mr.W.E. Bromet, the husband of Heaton's sister Constance, succeeded him as Managing Director.

In the 1930s Raiph Heaton V was appointed Secretary to the company, the last of the Heaton family to be steward of the company. In 1964 a bidding consortium was established between the Royal Mint, Birmingham Mint and Kynoch Mint to produce coins for export.

In 1988 Birmingham Mint purchased Green Duck Corporation in USA. The Birmingham Mint Group restructured into four divisions. Three years later, in 1991, IMI (formerly Kynoch Mint) acquired a controlling interest in Birmingham Mint Group after a contested take-over bid. IMI Mint subsequently moved to Birmingham Mint site and changed the company name changes to IMI Birmingham Mint Ltd. In 1993 the company purchased Casino Tokens Inc. USA.

In 1998 the company name reverted back to "The Birmingham Mint Ltd". The following year the American subsidiaries of the company were closed down. In 2000 Birmingham Mint Ltd secured its biggest ever-single order, over £45 million Sales Value, to supply German Mints with 1 & 2 Euro Coin Blanks. It struck 50 million 2 Euro coins for another European National Mint. The following year the company was sold to former CEO. Roland Vernon and colleagues, and in 2003 it was acquired by JFT Law & Co Ltd and Stirchley Machine Tools Ltd.

In 1968, the discovery of a box of cardboard impressions from the archives of Ralph Heaton & Sons determined that one hundred issues, attributed by Andrews to William Taylor and the Port Phillip Kangaroo Office, were actually manufactured in Birmingham by Heaton & Sons.

Born in Birmingham, Joseph Moore was apprenticed at a young age to diesinker Thomas Halliday. He also trained under Samuel Lines, another diesinker and engraver. After completing his apprenticeship he began his own business as a buttonmaker, winning a prize at the 1851 London Exhibition for his work. While engaged in his apprenticeship and working as a buttonmaker, he studied in his own time to gain the skills of a medallist.

He was a designer of medals principally, but first came to public attention when he created a 'model penny' in 1844. This penny was so popular with the public that the coin diesinker at the Royal Mint felt compelled 'to advertise the fact that [the pennies] were the result of private enterprise and not a government issue' (Forrer, 1909). For some time he was in a partnership, Allen and Moore, thought by some to be the best medallists of the later nineteenth century.

Moore created some of the dies used by Heaton and Sons to produce coins and tokens. He is credited as the designer of the penny and halfpenny tokens issued by Professor Holloway (A660-A672) in 1857 and 1858. Sweeny argues that Holloway's tokens were produced in Heaton and Sons' Birmingham establishment, on the basis of cardboard impressions taken from dies bearing Holloway's head that were donated to The Birmingham City Museum by The Mint, Birmingham.

### Token---1Penny Die Combination TN-1.1&TN-1.2



The Alliance Tea Company of Christchurch, New Zealand issued penny tokens in 1866. The tokens advertised their address as the corner of High and Hereford Streets, 'opposite the Bank of New Zealand', under the management of Robert Taylor. Researchers have suggested that this central position is evidence that the business was perhaps 'one of the earliest businesses in Christchurch,' (Canterbury, 1950). The token advertises a wide range of groceries for sale at the store, beyond just tea, including 'Italian Warehouse Fancy Goods...Coffees, Fruits and Spices.'

An advertisement from 1876 shows a different business at this address and as a result it is thought that there was a 'transfer of the business' between 1866 and 1876.



### David Anderson, General Store Keeper, Wellington, New Zealand



David Anderson arrived in the New Zealand city of Wellington in 1849. Although Anderson had planned to travel to Auckland, he was attracted to a property for sale on Wellington's water front and established his general store there in Willis Street.

Numismatist AF. Robb suggests that he may have been the first trader in New Zealand to offer a mail order system, and he did so very profitably. In 1862 he opened a second store which his son David (one of the founder's thirteen children) ran for him. In addition to his own business, Anderson was also a founding member of the Wellington Chamber of Commerce.

Anderson issued both penny and half penny tokens, struck for him by Heaton & Sons of Birmingham. The exact date of their issue is not known, but the Museum Victoria catalogue gives a date of circa 1858.



G.L. Beath & Co. was actually founded by a Mr. Kirby in 1860, and Beath only joined the company in 1866. Kirby later left the business, and Beath brought in his brother-in-law, Frank Malcolm. Beath and Malcolm remained in business together until 1896, trading as G.L. Beath & Co.. Their premises were on Cashel Street, Christchurch.

Beath suffered substantial loss in 1871 when the former town hall, which he had leased after it was damaged by an earthquake, burned down while 3000 pounds worth of stock was inside. At the time he was only insured for damage up to the value of 1000 pounds.

Malcolm left the partnership in 1896 to go into business on his own account and Beath was joined by J.E. Wickenden, who had previously been a draper in London's West End. Together they expanded their store greatly, and in 1902 they transformed the business into a limited liability company. By this time Beath had retired from active involvement in the business, but he remained a director of the company until his death in 1914.

Between 1907 and 1935 the company acquired a number of properties until it occupied an entire block bounded by 'Packer's right-of-way, Cashel Street, and Colombo Street as far as, and including, Andrew's old-established pork butchery as well as the A.1 Hotel.' In 1935 a six storey store was built, including a tea-room and roof garden. 'Continued progress resulted in the purchase, in the year 1934, of Sorenson's block, thus giving access to Lichfield Street. The firm today [1950] occupies an area of about three-quarters of an acre in the heart of Christchurch. A programme of major extensions was interrupted by the outbreak of the second World War, to be resumed as soon as conditions permit.' (Canterbury, 1950)

The Museum Victoria catalogue records five varieties of tokens issued by this firm, all struck circa 1870 by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne.

A good clean example of this coin, the G.L.Beath coin is not often seen in this good condition, and is rare to find on



# Samuel Beaven, Ironmonger, South Island, New Zealand (circa 1830-?)



Samuel Beaven was the only token issuer in the town of Invercargill, in New Zealand's Otago Province. Beaven had a farm outside the town in 1859, and in 1861 he opened an Ironmongery store in a three storey building on Dee Street. Beaven sold his business to a man by the name of Hall-Jones in 1866 and then moved to Fiji. Numismatists Williams and Sutherland, in their biographical sketch about him, suggest that the reason for the rarity of his tokens might be that when he sold his business, Beaven melted down the tokens that he had not distributed.


During his time in Invercargill, Beaven was both successful and involved in public life. He was a member of the Provincial Council, donated a site for a church, and was involved in a failed land scheme at Stewart Island.



## BROWN, Charles

(1820-1901).

First Superintendent of Taranaki.

Charles Brown was born in London in 1820, the only son of Charles Armitage Brown (1786-1842), and Abigail O'Donohue, an Irish peasant woman, in whose care he spent his infancy.

Charles Armitage Brown had been engaged in the Russian trade, but when this fell away he entered the post-Napoleonic European literary world, where he became a close friend of such figures as Keats, Hood, and Walter Savage Landor. On Keats' death he took his son to Italy, settling in Florence until 1834, when considerations of young Charles' education necessitated a return to England. They settled at Plymouth, where Charles senior became interested in the Plymouth Company, editing their journal, until finally, in 1841, father and son emigrated to New Zealand in the first ships sent out by the Company, Charles arriving on the Amelia Thompson, and his father a few weeks later on the Oriental. Charles brought the machinery for a small sawmill, which he lost no time in erecting and, with his father, formed the firm "Charles Brown and Son", one of the first business enterprises in Taranaki. On his father's death a few months later, Charles took his place as one of the political leaders of the colony. He was returned to represent New Plymouth in the New Ulster Legislative Council in 1852 and, on proclamation of the Constitution Act soon afterwards, was elected first Superintendent of Taranaki Province, holding this office from 16 July 1853 to 13 December 1857. He envisaged his role as Superintendent to be that of an officer, representing the whole body of electors, in whom was centred the executive power of the province. As such, he deemed it to be his duty to act, if necessary, as a check upon the majority view of the Provincial Council whenever he considered this not to reflect the best interests of the province. As first Superintendent, Brown was responsible for instituting the provincial system of government in Taranaki, and it was generally conceded that he acquitted himself well in the task.

He was elected to the House of Representatives on 8 November 1855 as member for Grey and Bell, and sat until 16 August 1856, when he retired to contest the Superintendency. During the session he became Colonial Treasurer in the short-lived Fox ministry (May–June 1856). As the time for the provincial dissolution approached, the proprietors of the *Taranaki Herald* decided to oppose Brown's candidacy and he was defeated by George Cutfield. He then founded, and became principal

proprietor of, a new paper, the *Taranaki News*, a weekly whose first issue appeared on 14 May 1857. Brown managed this paper until he went on active service in 1860. He had become captain of the Taranaki Militia in 1855 and, when the Taranaki Rifle Volunteers were formed in 1859, he was appointed senior captain of the regiment. He served in the campaign following upon the Waitara Purchase, seeing his first action at Manutahi, and led the local colonial troops, who, with British Regulars under Colonel Murray, were sent to relieve settlers endangered at Omata, in the Waireka engagement (March 1860). Although inexperienced in military affairs, Brown distinguished himself by undertaking to relieve Jury's farm, where many of the wounded were concentrated, and Governor Gore-Brown promoted him to the rank of major in recognition of the feat. One of his junior volunteer officers in this engagement was H. A. Atkinson.

Brown continued his political career concurrently with his military service. He regained the Grey and Bell seat in 1858, when he defeated F. D. Bell, and held it until his militia service claimed his full attention. He represented New Plymouth town in 1864–65 and in 1868–70. He was again Superintendent of the province (1861–65), and represented New Plymouth in the Provincial Council (1866–69), (1874–76). He contested the Superintendency in 1873, but was defeated by F. A. Carrington. In his second Superintendency he originated and carried out the scheme whereby the Government authorised a £200,000 loan to compensate Taranaki settlers who lost their property during the war. After the war Brown carried on business in New Plymouth. For many years he was in partnership with John Duthie (who later founded the Wellington hardware firm, and became a member of the House of Representatives) in an ironmongery firm "Brown and Duthie". He also held Lloyd's agency for Taranaki. When he retired from business, he utilised his wide knowledge of the Maori language and customs as an interpreter in the New Plymouth Police Court. When returning home from interpreting a case on 2 September 1901 he was struck by a train on the Devon Street railway crossing and killed.

Brown married twice; in 1851, to Margaret Joy Horne (who died in 1875), daughter of an early Taranaki settler; and in 1881 to Jessie, daughter of W. Northcroft; and by these he had five daughters and two (twin) sons. Brought up as a Roman Catholic, Brown later joined the Church of England, in which faith he raised his family.

Although lacking the higher education enjoyed by many of his political contemporaries, Charles Brown succeeded by his caution, sound commonsense, and perseverance to one of the most important administrative positions in the colony. His greatest work belonged to the early days of colonisation, when his ability as an administrator and as a militia officer contributed significantly to the prosperity of the province in which he spent most of his life. He came to New Zealand when Hobson was Governor, and lived to see the liberal era of Richard John Seddon; his long life encompassed those of Atkinson, Ballance, Vogel, FitzGerald, and many other notable figures whom he knew personally.

A brief history of J. Caro & Co., Ironmongers, was published in *They Made their Own Money*, a volume on the token-issuing businesses of Christchurch, New Zealand.

It states that this business was established in 1860 in High Street, Christchurch, next to the town hall. The founder, J. Caro, sold it to Solomon Nashelski and his nephew in 1864. The business traded as S&H Nashelski until 1876, when it became S. Nashelski. In 1880 it was sold to Edward E. Ashby and L. Bergh, and it became a limited liability company in 1899. The business was still trading in 1950 when *They Made their Own Money* was published.

In addition to trading as ironmongers, advertisements published in the brief history suggest that, in the late nineteenth century, the company was in the building trade, actually constructing buildings as well as selling the fittings for them.

During the first years of the company, J. Caro & Co issued two varieties of penny tokens, made for them by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne. The tokens are undated but must have been issued between 1860 and 1864.

Clark prospered and brought his sons into the business, which ran until 1928. In addition to his successful business career Clark was also a prominent local and New Zealand politician of his day. Archibald Clark was a Scot, born in Ayrshire in 1805. He had trained to be a Presbyterian Minister but migrated to New Zealand in 1849 and opened a draper's business in Auckland. His premises were located in Shortland Street, and it was from this address that he issued his trade tokens in 1857. Clark prospered and brought his sons into the business. The business later moved to Wellesley Street West and ran until 1928.

In addition to his successful business career Clark was also a prominent local and New Zealand politician of his day. He was the first Mayor of Auckland in 1851 and a Member of the New Zealand House of Representatives between 1860 and 1874, representing first Auckland and then Franklin. In 1867 and 1868 he was a member of the Auckland Provincial Council. His son, J. McCosh Clark, was also Mayor of Auckland (1880-83) as well as briefly serving as a member of the Provincial council in 1870.

Clark is thought to have been New Zealand's first token issuer. Records from Heaton and Sons Mint, Birmingham, indicate that they manufactured Clark's tokens. Although this is thought to have been the earliest of the New Zealand tokens, the reverse bears the title "New Zealand' above the stock figure of Justice seated on a bale, suggesting a desire to make the tokens different to the Australian tokens that were so common at the time.

MR. ARCHIBALD CLARK represented the City of Auckland in the House of Representatives in 1860, the City of Auckland East from 1866 to 1870, and Franklin from 1871 to 1873. He was born at Beith, Scotland, in 1805, and was educated for the Presbyterian ministry at the University of Glasgow, where he acquired a taste for literature, which he retained throughout life. Before completing his studies at the University, he was re-called to Beith by the failing health of his father, Mr. Andrew Clark, and assumed the management of the business carried on there by him. On realising the great future before the Australasian Colonies, Mr. Clark determined to emigrate; and, having decided upon New Zealand as his future home, he arrived in Auckland in the latter part of 1849. He at once began to take an active part in public affairs, and was elected the first Mayor of Auckland in 1851. Mr. Clark was also elected on several occasions to the Provincial Council. He took a very active part in church and educational matters, and was for many years one of the leading members and elders of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. Immediately after his arrival in Auckland, Mr. Clark started business in Shortland Street, and some years later he took his sons into partnership, under the style of Archibald Clark and Sons. The business is now not only one of the oldest in New Zealand, but one of the most prosperous, and employs, in warehouse and factories, between 400 and 500 persons. Mr. Clark died in 1875.

Born 11 July 1836 in the parish of Greenwich, Kent, Samuel Clarkson was 14 years old when he arrived in Lyttelton, New Zealand, probably in late 1850, having left Plymouth, England, on board the Castle Eden on 8 October 1850. He had travelled with his father and in April 1851 they were joined by his mother and siblings. Some time after the family was reunited they decided to move to Christchurch and carried all their belongings across the mountains. Samuel's brother David and his wife Elizabeth were involved in two token issuing drapery businesses (the Christchurch drapery store they founded, 'Dunstable House', was sold to William Pratt, who issued tokens; their own second business, Clarkson & Turnbull of Timaru also issued tokens).

Samuel's father, John, was a builder by trade. He worked on a number of significant projects before his early death in 1855. Samuel followed his father's trade, working as a carpenter and contractor from Cashel Street, Christchurch (now number 324). He became a person of note after building 'a spectacular five-roomed house...which the owner...was able to occupy...on the seventh day after Clarkson commenced work on it.'

His first home was at 305 Cashel Street and he later built a two storey home at 137 Ollivier's Road. The house was still standing in 1950. In 1857 Samuel Clarkson married a Miss Lodge, who was said to have been the first European child born in Wellington.

After several years he went out of the building-contracting business, and opened a wholesale builder's merchant's warehouse in St Asaph Street, near Montreal Street. Cement was a speciality, and at this address the Trade Tokens which bear his name were issued in 1875.' He was a wholesaler for some years, and after retiring continued his involvement in the construction industry, acting as agent for a number of construction materials companies, including the Knight Bevan Portland Cement company, and the building supplies company Shaw, Savill & Co.. In his later years he was described as 'very round shouldered, with shaven face, and bowler had on the back of his head, known to everyone in the seventies and eighties.'

Clarkson died in Christchurch soon after his 59th birthday, on 29 July 1895.

The Principals were David Clarkson and Richard Turnbull. Timaru was only declared a Port of Entry in 1861, so it was still quite a young settlement when Clarkson and Turnbull opened their store. Their premises were of particular note in the township, 'a two-storey building at the corner of George Street and the South Road, whose cost would be about 2,500 [pounds]; plate glass for the windows was being imported from England at a cost of about 150 [pounds]. 'The business was the first to export flour from Timaru 'which since then has been continuous.' The partnership was disrupted on 9 December 1868 by a fire that consumed their premises, among a total of 30 buildings destroy ed. After their premises were destroy ed Clarkson & Turnbull dissolved their partnership. David Clarkson returned to Christchurch and Robert Turnbull remained in Timaru, carrying on their business in his own name.

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# Clarkson and Turnbull Penny Token

Some penny tokens were works of art.

Penny Tokens were issued in New Zealand from 1857 to 1881 by various commercial houses during a shortage of British pence and halfpence, copper coins. Forty-eight retailers such as merchants, grocers, drapers and milliners issued their own penny and half-penny tokens. This practice survived until 1881. Tokens were profitable for the traders because the cost of producing them was well below their face value and many were never cashed in because they were easy to lose. They were a good source of advertising too, as each token carried the business's name. Most of these tokens were made by T. Stokes in Melbourne, and in Australia all were called in, in 1868; but they continued in use in New Zealand, and the last being issued in 1881.

The reserve side with shows the breakwater as already in existence, a sailing ship in Timaru harbour and people walking towards the breakwater with a lighthouse at the end and is marked *New Zealand Timaru*.

Clarkson and Turnbull had a store at Temuka near the Crown Hotel and at the junction of Stafford Street and George Street, Timaru opposite the <u>Club Hotel</u>. The two storey store Timaru was built in 1864 at a cost of £2,500 and the plate glass windows were imported from England at a cost of £150. There was a major <u>time</u> in Timaru in 1868 and Clarkson and Turnbull lost their warehouse on the west side of Stafford Street, containing boots and the shoe department.

In 1868 Clarkson and Turnbull purchased wheat and flour from the Temuka district and exported it to London on the ship *Leichardt* with sailed on 11th April to London, direct, with 1,1609 bales wool, and 503 bags of flour, the latter valued at £600, but sailed without wheat.

#### DEATH OF MR TURNBULL, M.H.R.

Wellington, July 17. Mr Turnbull, member of the House of Representatives for Timaru, died this evening at 5 o'clock. He was sixty-four years of age, and had been ill for the last nine months. William Hall-Jones was elected member for Timaru at the by-election on 18 August 1890, a seat he retained until his resignation on 29 October 1908.

Our readers will be grieved but scarcely surprised to, learn this morning that Mr Richard Turnbull, after, a long and patient fight with a painful malady, at length succumbed to it. Mr Turnbull has made a place for himself in the memories of the people of Timaru of which most of us might well be proud, but he has occupied that place unostentatiously. Mr Turnbull was one of the oldest settlers of Canterbury, arriving in 1851, [sic - He arrived in 1864 on the Satima ?? but a sister arrived on the Danimon in 1851. Did he arrive in 1851? There was already a brother in Canterbury in one of the earlier vessels, the fifth or sixth if we mistake not. For some years he was engaged in farming near Christchurch. In 1864 be joined Mr D. Clarkson, a connection by marriage, in establishing a general store in premise on the site known as The Corner. Mr Turnbull had entire charge of their Timaru business. He also with a true foresight into the future progress of the town, but with no prevision of the great disaster which presently befell it, constructed several buildings, cottages and shops, in the neighbourhood of The Corner. All went well with him till the misfortune of December, 1868, when, the great fire made a clean sweep of the principal part of the town, and seriously crippled Mr Turnbull, as well as others, financially. The Corner was rebuilt in stone, and the partnership being dissolved, Mr Turnbull carried on the business on his own account for about a year, when he relinquished it, and took up the business of grain merchant, building for the purpose the large stone store which has since been transformed into the Theatre Royal. Ho presently added the business of auctioneer, and giving up the grain store removed to

George street, and thence to Beswick street, where he occupied premises for several years, As a citizen Mr Turnbull has deserved to be gratefully remembered. In the earlier days he was among the foremost in every good work calculated to improve the material and social status of the town. He worked hard for the establishment of the first public school, and his continued interest in matters educational has been shown in the fact that an address by him has for years past been counted on as part of the breaking up ceremonies of the public school. The Hospital may be said to have been one of his hobbies, and until incapacitated by his malady be was accustomed to conduct services there regularly on Sunday afternoons with such of the patients as wore willing to take part in them. He conducted similar services at the gaol in the early morning, and the inmates of both establishments found in. him not merely a religious adviser, but a Christian friend, always ready to do any kind offices for them that lay in his power. The Mechanics" Institute in its early days found him an always ready : helper. He was a member of the first Municipal Council and Borough Council, and in his place at their tables was an earnest advocate for such measures of : improvement as the water supply for the town and harbour works for the benefit of town and district, He was for several years a member of the Provincial Council for Timaru, and assisted Dr Rayner to obtain the provincial vote of £100,000 for the harbour works, which the General Assembly ratified on the abolition of the Provinces. The training in public affairs which theao experiences supplied, fitted him for a higher representative employment. He lost a contest for the Waimate seat, but very shortly afterwards, in 1878, on the resignation of Mr Stafford — one of the foremost statesmen for whose services New Zealand has had to be grateful, and who represented Timaru for many years -- Mr Turnbull was by general consent requested to succeed him. Mr Turnbull has ever since, and through the test of three or four elections, filled the seat of the representative of Timaru. We do not propose to give a sketch of his political views or political career, but may say that he was. always the "popular", or " working man's candidate," and the hold he had obtained upon their respect and esteem before he became a member of the House of Representatives has never been relaxed. We -have frequently differed from him on political questions, yet we cheerfully bear testimony to the earnestness and honesty of purpose which characterised the discharge of his duties as member for his constituency. Although Mr Turnbull was not in the front rank of Liberal politicians, his support of the Liberal party wag so zealous and consistent, that he will be greatly missed by that side of the House.

The southerly gale which blew on Friday night and Saturday morning upset all arrangements as to the time for performing the funeral ceremonies for the late Mr Turnbull. The Penguin left Wellington at 6.30 on Friday evening, and in ordinary weather should have reached Lyttelton on Saturday morning in time for the coffin to have been brought down by the express, or if moderately bad weather delayed the steamer's arrival, by a special train which should have arrived here early enough for the purpose. Intelligence was received at 1.30 p.m. on Saturday that the Peuguin had been signalled at Lyttelton, and the railway authorities arranged for a special train to start from Lyttelton immediately on her arrival. The special did not arrive at Timaru till 6 45 p.m., and therefore it became necessary to postpone the funeral till Sunday, the coffin on arrival being taken to Mr Turnbull's late residence, Grey Road. A testimony of the respect felt for the late member for Timaru by members of the House of. Representatives is the following telegram received by the Mayor on Saturday morning:- " The Mayor, Timaru, "Please oblige by procuring handsome floral wreaths on behalf of the undersigned friends in the House, and kindly send memo, of expense incurred. Mr Rhodes has wired Mr Perry to provide flowers if florists unable to supply them." (Signed for Sir George



Mr O. A. Wray, R.M., also received a telegram from Captain Russell, requesting him to attend the funeral as the representative of the Cabinet.

#### The Funeral.

The many friends of the deceased gentleman paid their last respects to his memory by attending his funeral yesterday afternoon. The procession was fully as long as was ever before seen at a funeral in Timaru. At the head marched the adult and junior members of Court Southern Cross, No. 3123, Ancient Order of Foresters, in charge of Chief Ranger Bro. Samuel McBride, the total roll being so numerous as to be close on the full strength of the Order in Timaru. Then followed the members of the Loyal Timaru Lodge, Independent Order of Oddfellows, Manchester Unity, with Bro. F. Cullmann as the Noble Grand. This Order was also numerously represented, and it is worthy of note here that the late Mr Turnbull had long been a brother of both the lodges named and had worked hard to further the interests of friendly societies in South Canterbury, Following the Oddfellows were the members of the Federated Wharf Labourers' Union, and then in turn came the brethren of the Hibernian Catholic Benefit Society, and next them and in front of the hearse the Timaru Garrison Band- The total on foot in front of the hearse was 264, and the band in addition numbered 20 men. Here it may be remarked that the deceased was "the oldest volunteer in Timaru," having been a member of No. 7 Company when volunteering was first started in South Canterbury. It was thus fitting that his body should be borne to its last resting place, on earth amid the strains of the solemn " Dead March." Beside the hearse walked Messrs F W. Stubbs, D. Stuart, George Hedges, G. W. Wade, James Bruce, and Adam Mahon, who, being among the oldest and most attached friends of the deceased, acted as coffin-bearers. Immediately behind the hearse were the chief mourners, the sons (Mr Arthur, Mr David, and Master Turnbull) walking, and Mrs B. Turnbull, Mrs T. Turnbull, and the Misses Turubull in the mourning carriage. Following the carriage were other vehicles containing Mr C. A. Wray (the Resident Magistrate and representative of the Ministry), Mr A. Perry, Mr J. W. White, Mr J. Jackson, Mr Cook (the chief postmaster), Mr W. Evans, Mr Woodsen, and Mr Gordon Wood, and other gentlemen. In a drag were the mayor, the councillors, and the officers of the council, accompanied by Mr J. H. Sutter and other ex councillors, Then came the Timaru Volunteer Fire Brigade, in charge of Captain Jones, sixteen members, and seven foot and mounted constables of Timaru with Sergeant-Major Mason as officer in charge. Following those bodies, who were in full uniform, came residents of Timaru and district to the number of 148, all on foot, and they were followed by 31 vehicles which were filled with people, and at the rear of the procession were seven horsemen. On the head of the procession arriving at St. Mary's Church a stoppage was made, and the coffin having been laid in front of the chancel the Boy. Mackenzie Gibson, read the first part of the service for the burial of the dead. Hundreds of people, lining the footpaths on the way. At the cemetery the friendly societies lined the roadway, and timid the uncovered head of the large mass of people, the coffin was reverently borne by three members of the Wharf Labourers' Union and three members of the Oddfollews Society to the grave, where the Rev. Mr Gibson concluded the service for the dead. The grave was the family one, and was in the oldest part of the cemetery. The religious ceremony over, the members of the friendly societies mid the usual honours to their late brother, and the funeral was at an end.

According to a biographical sketch prepared by New Zealand numismatist H.A. Robinson, Coombes was "was the only issuer of currency tokens in New Zealand who put his portrait on his tokens. He is depicted in the style of the day, full face, with side whiskers, and like King Henry VIII, whom he resembled, he made the mistake of showing his portrait almost full on, with nose protruding, instead of in profile."

Despite his unfortunate choice of portrait, it seems Coombes made very sensible business choices, as he appears that he owned an arcade at 86 Queen Street, in addition to having his own business there.

Coombes issued three varieties of copper penny tokens, and possibly a fourth, according to Robinson.

The firm was licenced to sell powder, shot and firearms from 1861. Walter Day was appointed Sub-Treasurer and Accountant for the Province of Otago in 1862 and became Acting Provincial Treasurer. Mieville had been a sheep farmer in Mataura Mouth in 1853 and married the following year. By 1904 he was in London (Williams & Sutherland, 1950).

The business bore the names of both men before the announcement of the partnership, as their penny token was issued in 1857. Stamps from the dies for the token were found in the records of Heaton and Sons, in Birmingham, raising doubts about the previously held belief that their tokens were made by W.J. Taylor (Sweeny, 1981).

#### Summary:

Copper One Penny Token, minted by W.J. Taylor, London. Issued by E. De Carle & Co, Merchants, Dunedin, circa 1862. De Carle arrived in Australia in 1849. Over the following fourteen years he was involved in a wide range of business ventures in Melbourne, taking advantage of the explosive growth caused by the gold rush. He later moved to New Zealand, where established this business. Lampard (p.40) reports that De Carle wrote to the 'Daily Telegraph' on 18 Feb 1862 to advise the public that his tokens would circulate as halfpennies not as pennies. De Carle's three different tokens, which featured his business as 'Grocers and Spirit Merchants,' 'Auctioneers and Land Agents' and 'Auctioneers, etc.,' indicated the range of his business activities and speculation. He was also involved in the urbanisation of Footscray and a section of Brunswick. De Carle operated his businesses with a number of partners, in a network of business dealings.

### E. De Carle & Co., Merchants, Dunedin, Otago, New Zealand



Edward De Carle was a successful Melbourne businessman who moved to Dunedin in the early 1860s. De Carle issued several varieties of tokens in Melbourne, both in his own name, and as a part of the partnership Hide & De Carle. For information about his earlier career, see E. De Carle & Co. - Melbourne.

Williams and Sutherland state that his tokens were issued in Dunedin in 1862. At this time they report his address to have been 22 Princes Street South. They also include a copy of a letter he had published in the Dunedin Daily Telegraph on 18 February 1863, in which he repudiated his tokens as pennies and called upon the public to only accept them as haifpences:

#### "Caution to the public'

(To the editor of the Daily Telegraph)

Sir,-Will you allow me a place in your columns to caution the public against receiving the new tokens, bearing the superscription of E. De Carle & Co., as pennies. In size they are equal to the new English penny and as such were consigned to me from home; but I have sold them at great loss to myself as half-pennies, and as such they should now pass.

I am. Sir.

Yours truly.

E. De Carle."

Williams and Sutherland do not state whether his appeal to the public to respect the terms under which he on-sold his tokens was accepted, but it seems unlikely. They theorise that De Carle may have heard that tokens had been made illegal in Victoria, and he had presumed that the same would happen in New Zealand so he divested himself of the risk by selling his tokens at a discount (Williams and Sutherland, 1950).

Williams and Sutherland go on to say:

The De Carle Dunedin token was dated about the time of the gold rush in Otago, and this may have attracted De Carle to Dunedin. In 1864 he advertised that his 'Forwarding Department for all the Gold Fields' was at 20 Princes Street. This firm owned property in Dunedin in 1868.'

Born in England on July 18, 1814, Forsaith decided to migrate to New Zealand after working on several vessels, one of which took him to New Zealand. He lived for a time in the Mangawhare region of Auckland, where his house was destroyed by Maoris. During the process of seeking compensation, the government discovered that he was fluent in the Maori language, and he became a 'sub-protector of natives'. 

### FORSAITH, Thomas Spencer

(1814-98).

Trader, politician, Congregationalist pastor.

T. S. Forsaith was born in 1814 in London of strict Primitive Congregationalist parents; his father was Samuel Forsaith, a linen draper and haberdasher, and his mother, Elizabeth née Emberson. At an early age Forsaith was apprenticed to a Croydon silk merchant but, disliking this occupation, he determined to go to sea. He engaged secretly as cabin boy on a Tyne-bound collier, but his intention was discovered and his parents, hoping to disgust him with the rigours of a seaman's life, allowed him to make one voyage. After this he joined Charles Horsfall and Co., the shipping firm, and as a cadet officer made three voyages to the East in the *Huddersfield*. In 1834 he sailed as fourth officer in the *Hoogley* which was under charter by the Government to transport convicts to Botany Bay. In July 1836, in the *Lord Goderich*, he again visited Australia and on the return voyage called at Hokianga to collect a cargo of kauri spars.

On 17 May 1838, at the Congregational Church in Old Broad Street, London, Forsaith married Elizabeth Mary, daughter of Robert Clements, of Hoxton — their wedding being one of the first legally celebrated in a dissenting place of worship. Later in the same year he chartered the *Coromandel*, loaded it with trade goods and lumbermaking machinery, and emigrated to New Zealand. In 1839 he purchased two blocks of land in the Kaipara district and established a trading station on the northern Wairoa River. He also erected a mill to cut kauri spars (then selling at £17 each) for the British Government, and imported cattle and farm implements to break in his land. By May 1841 he had cleared and fenced 12 acres, of which 10 acres were sown in wheat. In February 1842, while Forsaith and his wife were visiting Sydney, a Maori skull was discovered on his property. Local chiefs claimed that a *tapu* had been broken and exacted *utu*, or payment, by plundering the station. Forsaith petitioned Governor Hobson for compensation. The claim was investigated by George Clarke the Protector of Aborigines. His report cleared Forsaith of complicity, and the chiefs responsible agreed to cede him a small block of land (10 square miles) by way of settlement. This was the first occasion on which Government Officers had visited the district and Clarke made valuable recommendations concerning the establishment of a magistracy there.

This incident so upset Forsaith that, shortly afterwards, he exchanged his holdings for an equivalent tract nearer to Auckland. In March 1842, because of his wide experience among the Maoris and his command of their language, he was appointed by Hobson Sub-protector of Aborigines. In 1843 he was promoted Protector in succession to Clarke. In this capacity he worked closely with Governor FitzRoy whom he accompanied to the Cook Strait area in 1844, and to the great Maori meeting at Waikanae after the Wairau affray. Forsaith was stationed in Wellington and in February 1844 was present at the signing of the Te Aro land purchase. In April 1845 he negotiated with Rangihaeata to secure Maori evacuation of the Hutt lands, and proposed that a system of trade tokens be instituted to prevent the barter trading between Maoris and Europeans which, as he saw it, was the cause of their reluctance to leave the district. Later in the year he acted as interpreter for Major M. Richmond, the Government Superintendent for the Southern District, and Bishop Selwyn in their successful endeavour to bring peace to the warring Wanganui tribes. When, in 1845, Te Rauparaha paid a ceremonial visit to Wellington, Forsaith met and escorted him through the town.

In 1847 he left the Government's employ and opened a drapery store in Auckland where his neat redbrick premises became one of that city's show-places. For a short time he edited the Southern Cross newspaper and in August 1852 was elected to represent the Northern Division in the New Ulster Legislative Council; in August 1853 this district returned him to the first General Assembly. During the controversial debates on responsible government, Forsaith was the only member to oppose E. G. Wakefield's motion. He admitted that responsible government was desirable but argued that, under existing circumstances, it was improper for Parliament to expect the Administrator (Wynyard) to introduce a constitutional change which was clearly beyond his legal authority. On the division following FitzGerald's resignation, Forsaith was among the 10 members who refused to force the issue. Because his consistent championing of the Administrator's position lent credence to the belief that Forsaith led an "opposition" group whose views were more in accord with Wynyard's, he was called upon to select three colleagues to join the Executive Council. On 31 August 1854 Forsaith, and E. J. Wakefield, W. T. L. Travers, and James Macandrew, took their seats in the Executive Council, but without portfolio. The "Ministry's" views were set forth in the Governor's Address to the second session of Parliament, and included such items as an elective Legislative Council, revision of electoral districts, and clarification of the relative spheres of the General and Provincial Governments. The drafting of this speech was the "Ministry's" sole official act and, when their prepared Address in Reply was rejected by the House on 3 September 1854, Forsaith and his colleagues resigned. Constitutionally, Forsaith, like his predecessor FitzGerald, has no claim to be regarded as a Premier of New Zealand.

Shortly before his elevation to office, Forsaith had tabled a motion to secure religious toleration and, on 28 August 1855, he defeated Carlton's attempt to have Bishop Selwyn's salary made a charge on the Colonial Government. This had the effect of disestablishing the Anglican Church in New Zealand. Defeated at the polls in 1855, Forsaith returned to business, becoming a Justice of the Peace in 1857. He was re-elected to Parliament in April 1858, but his sincere, if ill-timed defence of Wiremu Kingi after the Waitara affair, effectively terminated his political career, and he retired in 1860.

In 1862 Forsaith gave up his business to enter the church. The Presbyterian authorities (he had joined that church in 1850) offered him a post as missioner at Tuapeka goldfields but he declined this, preferring to continue theological studies preparatory to ordination as a minister. In July 1865, however, he was ordained to the new Congregational pastorate at Port Chalmers. In 1867 he accepted a call to a similar pastorate at Woollahra, New South Wales. From there he removed (1868) to Parramatta and, in 1872, became chairman of the Congregational Union of New South Wales. In 1878 he was appointed resident chaplain at Camden Theological College, and, while there, founded a

branch mission at Haslam's Creek (now Hampden), New South Wales. He returned to Parramatta in 1882, and later toured Canada, America, and Europe. In Britain he gave a series of public lectures which attracted many new immigrants to New Zealand, and for a short time he officiated at the Presbyterian Church in Venice. In 1884 he left Europe and for some years relieved at churches in Australia and New Zealand (notably in Dunedin and Invercargill). Early in 1898 Forsaith began his memoirs but had not proceeded far when he died, at Parramatta, on 29 November 1898.

As one of the earliest settlers in the Kaipara district, Forsaith acquired the unique reputation of dealing fairly with the Maoris in land transactions. His understanding of Maori language and customs and his tactfulness in dealing with their problems made his services invaluable to New Zealand's first three Governors. As a parliamentarian, he impressed his contemporaries as a serious thinker and an able debater, and it was unfortunate that his political career ended at such an early stage. Forsaith was a deeply religious man. Although he was a Presbyterian for many years, his best services were given to the sect of his youth, the Congregationalists. He entered their ministry relatively late in life but proved, in a quiet unassuming way, both in Australia and in New Zealand, that he was a truly great pioneer of the church.

THIS Deed made the Third day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one Between Thomas Spencer Forsaith of Auckland in the Province of New Ulster in the Territory of New Zealand Mercer of the one part and Hastings Atkins of the same place Merchant of the other part Whereas by Crown Grant bearing date the thirtieth day of December in the year One thousand eight hundred and forty-four under the hand of Robert Fitz Roy Esquire then Governor of the said Territory and under the seal thereof. After reciting that one of the Commissioners appointed to hear examine and report upon claims to land obtained by purchase from the Aboriginal Inhabitants of New Zealand had reported that the said Thomas Spencer Forsaith was entitled to receive a Grant of Three hundred and fifty-one acres of Land particularly mentioned and described in claim No. 281, Her Majesty Queen Victoria did grant unto the said Thomas Spencer Forsaith his heirs and Assigns All that allotment or parcel of Land therein and herein after described And whereas the said Hastings Atkins has



The book about Christchurch token issuers, They Made their Own Money, includes the following information:

'In 1866 there were two butchers listed in the postal directory: William Gaisford, Sandyford Street, Sydenham, and G. Edmonds, 71 East Town Belt, Christchurch. The latter site was located on the corner of Fitzgerald Avenue and Tuam Street. It is possible that these were the partners in the Colombo Street business of an earlier date, but no proof has been secured to support this supposition.'

Given that their tokens were issued circa 1875, it is also possible that they became partners later than 1866.

This firm traded briefly in Christchurch, probably from 1862 to 1865. The earliest record that Christchurch numismatists found while researching the company was from the 22 October 1862 edition of the local paper the *Christchurch Press.* It announced that the store would be opening on 15th of September, presumably this advertisement had been running for more than a month by the time the October edition seen by the researchers was printed. The advertisement said that Gourlay & Co. would be selling 'an assortment of General Ironmongery, comprising builders ironmongery, brassfoundry, carpenter's tools and a great variety of articles too numerous to mention in detail.' The store was known as Economy House, a popular mid-nineteenth century name for shops. The store was located in Ferry Road, Christchurch.

The business was listed in local directories until 1865 but after that there are no records of either the business or its owner. In 1864 part of Ferry Road was renamed High Street. The fact that Gourlay's tokens give his address as High Street and not Ferry Road indicates that the tokens were most likely issued in either 1864 or 1865. The maker of the tokens is unknown, but they are thought to be of British manufacture.



Henry Joseph Hall, who was well known in early Christchurch as a grocer and land owner, emigrated to New Zealand from Guernsey, one of the islands in the English Channel. Hall arrived in Christchurch in 1857, where he took up 60,000 acres of land in North Canterbury, called Motunau, as well as land at Birdling Brook and Leeston.

In addition to these agricultural properties Hall also had significant property interests in Christchurch, and opened a grocery store in Cashel Street West in 1864. However he moved to High Street the following year when the site of Methodist Church was put up for sale as the congregation had become too large for the space. He paid 5800 pounds for the site.

Hall kept the business until 1873, selling it so that he could give more attention to his land interests, both in the city and the country. It is not known how much longer the business kept operating after he left it, but a photograph from 1892 indicates that half the building was then in the hands of another business, Mrs. Withers' Art Needlework Depot and Fancy Repository. He died in about 1896.

Hall issued nineteen different penny token varieties, and three halfpennies. They were very simply designed, with text and no graphic elements in their design. He had a very large number of tokens in circulation, requiring between 18 and 22 separate orders to have these many varieties minted. English medallist W.J. Taylor and Australian Thomas Stokes both struck tokens for him at their mints.








Image: Hobday & Jobberns Token Penny

The date of this firm's establishment, and the identities of its principals are unknown. The firm is known to have existed from some time after 1873, when Thomas Stokes took Mr Martin as a partner to form the Stokes and Martin mint, the company that struck Hobday and Jobberns' tokens.

The drapery business was located in Cashel Street, Christchurch and 'was well known in the early days.' (They Made their Own Money, p.42.)

The bulk of the details given in *They Made their Own Money* concern the firm's fiery end. Just before two o'clock in the afternoon of October 1888, a fire started in a pressing room upstairs in Hobday & Jobberns' building. When first noticed it could have been stopped by a bucket of water if there had been a bucket handy, but it got out of hand and swept through the brick two-storey building on the corner and the three-storey building next to it on the corner of Colombo Street. When the brigade arrived it gave its immediate attention to saving the adjoining buildings and the A.1. Hotel on the opposite side of Colombo Street...'These were damaged by water and smoke, but on all sides it was agreed that the brigade did a great job by confining the fire to Hobday's block. Hobday and Co. had about sixty hands, but half of them were away at lunch, and the others got out without difficulty. The name of the firm had evidently been altered since the issue of the tokens.'

'Hobday's building was rebuilt in 1889 and was taken over by Lonargan and Lonargan and McClea.'

The business issued two varieties of penny tokens, circa 1873. The tokens were struck for them by Martin & Stokes of Melbourne.

AA Kidd published a brief biography of Hurley in *The New Zealand Numismatic Journal*, June 1979, (pp. 32-35). A summary is given below:

John Hurley migrated to New Zealand with his parents and siblings in 1842, at the age of 12. They settled in Wellington where his father, Alexander, ran a bakery on Lambton Quay.

In 1853 John moved to Wanganui and opened his own bakery in Victoria Avenue, the first in the town. His range of goods included bread, biscuits, confectionery and groceries; he also supplied ships. He married a local woman, Lorenna Cunnabel, on January 24, 1855 at Brunswick Station, a few miles from the town. They had four children.

Kidd included the following quote about Hurley's business, written by Cornelius Burnett when he visited the town in 1857:

'Next came Mr. John Hurley's bakery, a busy place, where a variety of industries were carried on, afterwards taken up by some new arrivals, who are said to have done very well with them indeed. A description of this place will give a very vivid idea of the locality. The shop, a mere shanty, long and low, had evidently at first been built upon the level of the street, but as the wind and rain hollowed out Victoria Avenue into a gully which must have been at one time nearly 25 feet below the original level, step after step had to be added so as to allow of access from the road to the level of the shop. At the time I first knew it there were five or six shops, and many an old whater 'half seas over' have I seen disappear at night from the door of the shop, head first into the pitch dark street, from the bottom of which rather strong language would be heard, sounding in the distance like the smothered multerings from a bottomless pit. Being accustomed to tumbling down hatchways, however, these worthy descendants of the old Norse gods probably soon got over their falls." (Kidd, 1979)

Hurley sold his business on the 8th of January 1857 to a wealthy local man, Mr Joseph Augustus Burnett. However in 1864 he bought it back. The same year Hurley's brother Henry arrived in Wanganui, and Kidd suggests there was a connection between these two events. He also suggests that Henry started the firm Hurley Brothers, bakers and bootmakers, at this time. It has been suggested that because Hurley's tokens bore the name "J. Hurley & Co." his brother and father also had interests in the business.

In 1867 Hurley advertised in the Wanganui Evening Herald, stating that two pound loaves cost 4 pennies for cash, or 5 pennies for credit, he also offered hot dinners in addition to his bakery goods.

An almanac advertisement from 1878 showed how John Hurley's business had expanded. As well as bread, biscuits and confectionery, he also listed wholesale and retail grocery and emphasised his ability to create wedding cakes. Hurley later built a much more substantial bakery, a two storey, double fronted wooden building with glass across the front, to display 'confectionery goods and wedding ornaments to the left and shipping and grocery provisions to the right.' (Kidd, 1979, p. 34)

Hurley was one of the leading citizens of Wanganui. He was a founding elder of the Presbyterian Church, a member of the British and Foreign Bible Society and the Benevolent Society. Hurley advertised in the Wanganui Evening Herald until May 1881, when he retired to Manaia and farmed on the Waimate Plains until his death at the age of 71, on 12 September 1901.

Hurley issued both penny and half penny tokens. The Museum Victoria catalogue gives the approximate dates of issue for his tokens as c.1875 and c.1870 respectively. Although Kidd does not specify a year of issue, he suggests that the late 1860s is the most likely period. Hurley's tokens bear the maker's details "Todman, London". These issues are the only pieces known to bear that name.

James Jones and Alexander Williamson's token described their firm as "Wholesale and Retail Grocers, Wine, Spirit, and Provision Merchants'. They are thought to have traded together from about 1858 to 1864.

Little is known about Jones, but Williamson was from Selkirk, Scotland, and arrived in New Zealand in 1852. In 1863 he was living in Queen Street, Dunedin. In that year Jones was living in North Princes Street.

They issued their token in 1858. In that same year they placed an advertisement in the Otago Witness newspaper to inform the public that they had bullocks for sale.

According to the Daily Telegraph in 1863 the firm improved their premises with verandas. The following year Jones was not listed in the town's directory and in 1865 Williamson continued to trade under both their names, although he was listed as sole proprietor.

Williamson was married in Otago, and was the father of seven children.



Kirkaldie and Stains is the only token issuing business from New Zealand known to still be a going concern (2005). Today Kirkcaldie and Stains is a prestigious retail business. It is the Wellington equivalent of Melbourne's George's department store. Their website, www.kirkcaldies.co.nz, lists the range of expensive/prestigious brands for which they are the sole Wellington and/or New Zealand agents.

According to the history of the company posted on their website, the key dates for the business are as follows:

1863 - Business founded by Englishman John Kirkaldie, who had been apprenticed as a draper, and Scot Robert Stains, who had a retail trade background. The men met in Sydney, Australia, and decided to pool their capital to establish a business in New Zealand. They settled on Wellington as the place, and their first store was the hulk of a wrecked ship, at Lambton Quay.

1864 - Moved into 'Waterloo House,' two storey premises on the same site.

1868 - Moved to new premises on land reclaimed from the harbour, corner of Lambton Quay and Brandon Streets. This site is part of the block of land still occupied by the business today.

1871 - 1876 - Branch store on the corner of Ghuznee and Cuba Streets, Wellington

1886 - Robert Stains returns to England and the partnership was dissolved. The business remained in the hands of the Kirkcaldie family until the 1930s.

1897 & 1908 - Extensions to the 1868 premises. 1908 extensions give the business the façade for which it is still famous today.

1897 - 1917 - Branch store in Napier, New Zealand. Since this branch was closed Kirkcaldie and Stains has been a single location business.

1931 - Business sold by the Kirkcaldie family to British Overseas Stores, an organisation with retail stores around the world.

1985 - Business bought by Renouf Corporation (later Hellaby Holdings). Significant redevelopment of premises, including construction of two 14 storey business towers at rear of block, completed 1989.

1994 - Hellaby Holdings sells business, stock bought primarily by people of Wellington, including staff and customers.

AF. Robb supplies some additional biographical details about the business and its principals in his article 'Currency Tokens and Wellington Tradesmen'. Kirkaldie was born in Scotland on 13 February 1838, and met Robert Stains while they were working in adjoining drapery businesses in London. They met again while they were both working at a drapery store in Sydney in the early 1860s. Their first shop was 16 feet square and converted by [previous owner] John Plimmer from the ship Inconstant which had been wrecked in 1849 on Barrett Reef... Even though Wellington was very small trade was brisk, and new premises were soon required. In 1868 two small sections further north in Lambton Quay were obtained from the Provincial Government at 12 [pounds] and 16 [pounds] per foot frontage (worth 500 [pounds] a foot in 1925)... High class goods at reasonable prices were a feature of the firm, they also had a large mail order business which totalled 15,000 letters in 1893... John Kirkcaldie was joined by his son Sidney in 1890... [The founder] retired to his Nairn Street Mansion in 1918 and died on 3 October 1925, aged 87. John Kirkcaldie had been Chairman of Wellington-Manawatu Railway when the government took it over, also Director of Commercial Union Assurance Co., and was connected with Kelburn Land and Estate Co. and Kelburn Tramway Co. and the Wellington Deposit, Mortgage, and Building Association.' (Robb, 1972, p.62)

The firm placed a prominent three page advertisement in *Bull's Wellington Almanac for 1866*, taking up the last pages in the volume. Their advertisement was made even more prominent because it used blue ink (rather than the black) for two of the pages. The pages were arranged as follows 1) Picture of Waterioo House', with text side bars; 2) Description of Drapery trade; 3) Description of milinery and mourning trade.

Kirkcaldie and Staines are thought to have issued their penny and halfpenny tokens in 1875. The maker is not known.

## Summary:

This copper Halfpenny mule token was minted by W.J. Taylor of London. It is a L. Levy Halfpenny token, issued in Wellington, New Zealand, muled with a O.H. Hedberg Token Halfpenny, issued in Hobart, Tasmania, circa 1875. Taylor retained the dies for both tokens and used them to make mules in the 1880s. This token was struck with the die combination of Hedberg of Hobart and Lipman Levy of Wellington obverses. The British museum also has an example of this token which it received in 1878.

Hedburg was originally from Sweden but settled in Hobart in 1844 and became involved in the whaling industry. After the decline of the whaling industry in the mid-1850s, he opened a business as a produce merchant and commission agent in Argyle Street, Hobart, it is from this business his tokens were issued.

Born in London, Levy moved to Wellington in 1842 and opened a business importing and manufacturing shoes and grindery (tools for shoemakers and leatherworkers). Levy issued four varieties of tokens, three pennies and one halfpenny, which were issued between 1857 (when the first tokens were issued in New Zealand) and his death in 1880.

Lipman Levy, born in London in 1823, emigrated to Sydney in 1841. He moved across the Tasman to Wellington in 1842 and founded a business with David Isaacs. They were importers and merchants, dealing mostly in shoes and the grindery trade (the tools for making and mending shoes).

Levy returned to Sydney in 1850 as a result of illness, and despite becoming very ill he returned to Wellington, in 1851 he took control of the firm with his brother Benjamin. Lipman's talent as a trader led to his involvement in a wide range of civic and mercantile interests, including the Town Board, the Wellington Benevolent Society, Wellington Gas Co., as well as a number of others. He was encouraged to go into politics, but chose to concentrate on business. In addition to his interests in philanthropic work, he was a Mason for many years, and was Past Master in the New Zealand Pacific Lodge, the oldest in New Zealand. Levy died on 27 January 1880, aged 58, after a brief illness. He was married but had no children.

Levy advertised his business in almanacs for Wellington and New Zealand. Isaacs and Levy, Boot and Shoe makers, Lambton Quay' were listed in the Wellington Almanac for 1851. In 1855 he inserted an advertisement in the New Zealand Almanac that read 'Boots and Shoes, Leather, and Grindery, L. Levy, [late Isaacs and Levy]...Trade liberally supplied.' Levys 1855 advertisement suggests that his partnership with Isaacs ended in 1854. He was also listed at the same address in almanacs for 1859 and 1866.

Robb comments that grindery was an important aspect of the business. Grindery is the name given to the tools used by shoemakers and other leather workers. It seems likely that Levy was engaged in substantial wholesale, as well as retail trade, selling tools and materials to other shoemakers.

Levy issued four varieties of tokens, three pennies and one halfpenny. Their dates of issue are unknown, but must have been between 1857 (when the first tokens were issued in New Zealand) and his death in 1880. Museum Victoria's catalogue gives a number of possible dates of issue: circa 1855, circa 1860 and circa 1880.

Part of the basis for the acceptability of trade tokens was the fact that they were made from copper, and so had value regardless of their utility as instruments of exchange. Morris Marks ran a pawnbroking and general store business on the corner of Queen and Wellesley Streets in Auckland, and while at that address he issued one variety of penny trade token. There is no information known on the date he established his business, but H.A. Robinson found that by 1882 he shifted his premises to Grey Street.

Marks' tokens were made of brass rather than copper, and were smaller than a standard penny. As a result, they were not popular with the public. Part of the basis for the acceptability of trade tokens was the fact that they were made from copper, and so had value regardless of their utility as instruments of exchange. By making his tokens from brass, which had less value as a metal, Marks may have got a brighter, shinler token, but he failed to recognise the full range of qualities the public appreciated in these unofficial coins. As a result, his tokens are quite rare.

According to the Museum Victoria catalogue, Marks issued his tokens circa 1880, making him one of the last of the Australasian token-issuers. His tokens were struck by Stokes and Martin, Melbourne.

The reverse die used for this token was cut by Julius Hogarth. Mason and Struthers was the business name used by partners Frederick Mason and Robert Struthers from 1878 to 1899, when they ran an ironmongery business in Christchurch, New Zealand. The company continued to trade at that address in various forms until at least 1950. The partnership was dissolved in 1899 when Mason came to Australia to promote the Deering reaping and binding machine, and Struthers continued the business on his own. He sold it in 1903 and lived out the rest of his life in his home in Christchurch.

# ILLUSTRATED GUIDE TO CHRISTCHURCH AND NEIGHBOURHOOD

### MESSRS. MASON, STRUTHERS & CO.

This firm commenced business in Christchurch in. 1874 in premises known as Pratt's Buildings, in Colombo-street. After a short time they built their present warehouse, a three storey brick building, at the corner of Colombo and Lichfield-streets; and, subsequently, their brick warehouse (two storeys and a basement), No. 66, Lichfield-street. Besides these two establishments the firm also have large premises in St. Asaph-street, where they show the Deering's reaper and binder, they being the agents for Wm. Deering, of Chicago. In pushing this well-known agricultural machine the firm have been eminently successful. In the first year of their agency they obtained for it five gold medals at various Agricultural Societies' meetings, and at trials where it was exhibited. As a proof of the estimation in which it is held by farmers, we may mention that there are over 700 of them at work in New Zealand.

The Colombo-street premises are devoted to hardware, plated goods, &c., from England, America, and the Continent. On the ground floor are the offices for clerks and for the members of the firm; and a large room fitted with counters and show cases, where are displayed a varied and large assortment of ironmongery, electro-plated ware, cutlery, lampware, carpenters' brass and iron fittings, and all the numberless sundries of the trade. Upstairs we find a large show room for larger articles, and a packing room where the wholesale orders are got ready for despatch. In the top floor of this building are stored all kinds of lighter ironmongery in wholesale quantities. Returning to the ground floor we come to the sheds where the wholesale stocks of bar and sheet iron, sheet lead, &c., are stored; and passing through the yard, where is more iron stacked in racks, we come to a shed 30 feet by 60 feet, filled with all kinds of American implements, in which the, firm do a large wholesale trade. There is also a fitters' shop, where are to be seen at work men busy making horse collars for gig, coach, cart and buggy harness.

The Lichfield-street establishment is next worth inspection. The basement of this is well stored with wholesale packages of hardware goods, heavy ironware, glass, oils, paints, &c. Upstairs is a large show room devoted to grates, ranges, marble mantelpieces, mangles, &c., in great variety of pattern and cost. On the floor above we come to the saddlery manufactory and show rooms. This industry, which Messrs. Mason, Struthers & Co. are the only ones to follow in Christchurch, forms a very considerable portion of the firm's business. Their dealings in it are entirely wholesale, their customers being the retail shopkeepers throughout the colony. So far as possible all the materials used are of colonial manufacture, so that the firm may be congratulated on having successfully started a valuable local industry. A glance through the show room will convince any expert of the excellence of the articles manufactured, and their superiority to the bulk of the imported articles with which they have to compete. We should mention that in their several establishments Messrs. Mason, Struthers & Co. employ over fifty hands.

Mason and Struthers was the business name used by partners Frederick Mason and Robert Struthers from 1878 to 1899, when they ran an ironmongery business in Christchurch, New Zealand. Their premises were at the corner of Colombo and Lichfield Streets, and the company continued to trade at that address in various forms until at least 1950.

The partnership was dissolved in 1899 when Mason came to Australia to promote the Deering reaping and binding machine, and Struthers continued the business on his own. He sold it in 1903 and lived out the rest of his life in his home in Christchurch. After his death his house became a hostel for a Girls' High School.

The company's tokens were struck by Stokes & Martin of Melbourne, circa 1872, according to the Museum Victoria catalogue.

George McCaul was born in Perthshire, Scotland, in 1835. He completed his apprenticeship as a plumber there, before moving on to Birmingham and then to London. When the gold rushes began in Australia he travelled to Adelaide and then to the gold fields.

He tried his luck again in the early 1860s when gold was discovered in New Zealand, sailing on the *Red Jacket* to a field known as Gabriel's Gully, near Lawrence in Otago province. He moved on to the Hokitika fields when gold was discovered there. To get there, he and many others had to cross New Zealand's South Island from east to west, and cover more than half the island's length in their journey. Many men died during the journey. McCaul did not have any luck at the Hokitika fields either, but H.A. Robinson records that he remembered 'two ton of the precious stuff taken out of the famous Caledonia (mine) in a week.' (Robinson, 1974)

After abandoning gold prospecting McCaul moved to Grahamstown in Thames, in the north of the North Island, where he returned to his trade. He issued a trade token penny there in 1874, and is said to have put it into circulation by paying his men in it. After retiring from his business he moved to Auckland and died there in 1931 at the age of 96.

A letter presented in *The New Zealand Numismatic Journal*, March 1963, written by Mears' grandson, H.G. Redding, gives some details about his forebear's life:

'My Grandparents arrived in Wellington from Scotland, calling at Sydney en route in the Brig Prima Donna, 1st March 1854. Walter James Mears, Saddler, his wife, Eliza Mears, nee Campbell, opened Saddler's business opposite Noah's Ark, opposite Bank N.Z. on the corner of Willis St. and Lambton Quay, 1859. Afterwards shifted to Willis St. [in] 1866 ... My parents lived on 'Mears Paddock', in Abel Smith St. The house [at numbers] 98-100 is still standing, built in 1855.'

The house on Abel Smith Street, referred to above, was Mears' home from 1878. The dates of his death and birth are unknown.

The 1855 New Zealand Almanac included an advertisement for 'J. Mears, Saddler, Collar, and Harness Maker, (opposite Noah's Ark) Lambton Quay, Wellington, N.B. Second-hand Saddles bought, sold and exchanged, 't is interesting to note that, although his grandson gaves Mears' name as Walter James, the article does not comment on the fact that his tokens were issued under the name 'J.W. Mears'. Given the date of the advertisement it seems that the chronology offered by Redding was not precise, as Redding states that Mears opened the store in 1859, four years after the advertisement was published.

Mears' first store was opposite those premises occupied by Kirkcaldie and Stains, another Wellington firm that issued tokens. Kirkcaldie and Staines occupied those premises between 1863 and 1866.

When Milner retired Thompson continued in the business until he passed it to his sons in 1907. The business was bought by Charles Begg and Co. in 1920, and was still a going concern in 1950. Milner & Thompson were the last issuers of tokens in New Zealand. The firm had a number of novel advertising schemes, in addition to the tokens. They installed a 'phantom piano' on the ground floor, which was set up to give the appearance of being played, while it was in fact being operated from a key board and set of pedals installed in the basement below. R. Thompson, senior, the sole proprietor. Mr. Thompson has from early manhood been intimately associated with music and matters relating to it. He was born at Harrow, Middlesex, England, in 1835, educated at one of the celebrated Harrow schools, and arrived at Lyttelton in 1856.

JENKINS, EDGAR HENRY, Organ Builder, Ferry Road, Christchurch. Mr. Jenkins' factory, situated in Ferry Road, is a fine large hall, where six hands are employed in organ construction. Mr. Jenkins has built some of the finest organs in New Zealand, and he has supplied some of the largest churches in the colony with instruments, which take the highest place for beauty of tone and perfection of mechanism. The organ in St. John's Church, Latimer Square, was rebuilt by him in 1875, with twenty-nine stops and 1300 pipes, and was at that time considered the largest in New Zealand, Mr. Jenkins built the fine organ in the Wesleyan Church, Kaiapoi, and also built and erected that in use at St. Bartholomew's Church in the same place. The fine organ used at the Christchurch Cathedral in its earlier days, and which now does duty in Merivale Church, was built and erected by Mr. Jenkins, and the splendid organ now in the Cathedral, built by Messrs Hill and Son, of London, was erected and fitted with a gas motive power by him. Mr. Jenkins also built and erected the fine organ at Avonside Church. The organ of the Congregational Church, Moray Place, Dunedin, which is considered one of the finest in the southern churches, was also built by Mr Jenkins. High-class testimonials from Wanganui and Gisborne churches give further evidence of Mr. Jenkins' skill. During the Exhibition held at Wellington in 1885, his organ on exhibition there was used at all the recitals and oratorios held in the building, and was afterwards purchased for St. Mary's Catholic Church, Christchurch. Besides the numerous instruments built by him to order Mr. Jenkins has re-built, enlarged, and repaired many others with the most satisfactory results. Flattering notices of his workmanship have at various times appeared in the English musical papers, and some of the leading New Zealand organists have borne testimony to its perfection. He built to order the fine organ in use at the new North Belt Presbyterian Church, Christchurch. Mr. Jenkins was born in England, and learned his business with Messrs Hill and Son, of London, the eminent English organ builders. In 1858 he went to Paris to gain greater experience in the various branches of his profession, and was engaged by Messrs

Cavaille, Coll, and Co., the builders of the celebrated organ at the Madeline, and of the monumental organ at the Church of St. Surplice, Paris. After some time he was sent by that firm to build an organ at St. Sebastian, in the north of Spain, on the construction of which he was engaged two years. On his return to Paris his employers were so pleased with his ability that they made him tempting offers to remain, but he decided to return to London, and re-entered the service of his old employers, Messrs Hill and Son, with whom he remained six years. In 1869 he arrived in New Zealand, where he became manager for his brother, who then owned extensive flax mills at Kaiapoi: the mills have since been rebuilt and converted into the Kaiapoi Woollen Mills. In 1871 Mr. Jenkins returned to Christchurch, with the intention of following his profession as organ builder, and his first contract was the enlargement of the organ at St. John's Church, Latimer Square. Since his arrival in New Zealand Mr. Jenkins has refrained from taking part in political matters, although he was well known in that connection in England. He took a prominent part in the popular agitation in favour of the Reform Bill of 1863. As Secretary of the Organ Builders' Society, he was deputed with Mr George Potter (a prominent leader of the reform party) to interview Mr. Disraeli and Lord John Manners, to allow the reformers to hold a demonstration in Hyde Park. The people considered this to be their right, but the Government was equally determined to refuse. Messrs Potter and Jenkins were then deputed to call on Lord Ranlegh, who gave permission to hold the meeting at Beaufort grounds, Brompton, and thus got the Government out of a serious difficulty. At the meeting which ensued 25,000 persons took part, and Mr. Jenkins marshalled over 10,000 of those who took part in the procession. The result was that the Conservative Government passed the Reform Bill, giving a large extension of the franchise. Mr. Jenkins in his early years, was an enthusiastic volunteer, and at the age of nineteen he volunteered for service in the Crimea, where he took part in the siege of Sebastopol, and received the Crimean and Turkish medals and the Sebastopol clasps. He was afterwards employed by the Aeronautical Society-of which Lord Holland and the late Duke of Argyll were presidents—to construct a flying machine, but he failed after repeated attempts. Previous to his departure for New Zealand Mr. Jenkins was presented with a purse of sovereigns by the London and provincial organ builders,

in recognition of his services to the organ building trade. Mr. Jenkins is assisted in his business by his son, who gives promise of great ability in his father's profession.



SANDFORD, FREDERICK WILLIAM, Organ Builder, 62 Antigua Street, Christchurch. Mr. Sandford is more fully referred to elsewhere as manual instructor to the Board of Education, and instructor in carpentry at Christ's College and Grammar School. He has been engaged in organbuilding on his own account since 1884, his workshop being situated at the back of his private residence in Antigua Street. Mr. Sandford undertakes to repair and enlarge instruments, as well as to build new organs to order.

Milner & Thompson's Music store, the Canterbury Music Depot, was first sited at the comer of Colombo Street and Chester Street in Christchurch. It was already a music store in 1874 when Robert Thompson bought the business. Some time soon afterwards he took John Milner into partnership and they worked together for 21 years, when Milner retired. Thompson continued in the business until he passed it to his sons in 1907. The business was bought by Charles Begg and Co. in 1920, and was still a going concern in 1950.

Canterbury numismatists did not supply any details of Milner's history, but they recounted that 'Robert Thompson was from early manhood intimately associated with music and matters relating to it. He was born in Harrow, Middlesex, England in 1835, educated at one of the celebrated Harrow schools, and arrived in Lyttleton in 1856.'

The partners moved their business from the corner of Colombo and Chester Streets to High Street some years after acquiring the business. It was while they were at their High Street address that they issued their tokens. Numismatist Alan Sutherland states that 'they were the last issuers of tokens in New Zealand, first circulating them at an Exhibition held here, primarily for advertising purposes, but they later formed part of the general currency.' The firm's tokens are all dated 1881, and were struck for them by the Melbourne firm Stokes and Martin.

The firm had a number of novel advertising schemes, in addition to the tokens. They installed a 'phantom plano' on the ground floor, which was set up to give the appearance of being played, while it was in fact being operated from a keyboard and set of pedals installed in the basement below.

Thompson also ran a Booking Office for plays from the store from 1881, the first production advertised being staged by the Montague-Turner Opera Co. of Sydney.

After the firm moved to the corner of Manchester Street and Bedford Row (in 1916), 'On Saturday nights (at that time 'late closing night') a planist was stationed at the front door of the shop, and the police continually had to clear the footpath of the crowds who would gather to hear the excellent music thus provided freely.'





Benjamin Martin (B.M.) Petersen was born in the Norwegian city of Bergen in 1837, where he undertook a watchmaking apprenticeship. By the time he was 26 he had established his own business in High Street, Christchurch. As of 1950 a business with the same name was still trading in Christchurch.

Towards the end of the 1860s Petersen left Christchurch and established a branch of his business in London, with a store in Dunster House, Mincing Lane. In 1872 he was married in his home town and his only child, a son, was born in 1876. He died in the London suburb Anerley in 1916, aged 79. When he left Christchurch, Petersen sold his store to a Mr. Nashelski, who was also involved with J. Caro & Co., another token-issuing firm.

The High Street store was originally made of corrugated iron, and it was rebuilt twice, once in 1879 and then again in 1911, the second time being rebuilt out of brick and stone. As the Petersen store (the founder's name was retained after he sold it) only rented its site, eventually they had to move locations, and in 1946 they moved to 33-37 New Regent Street.

Although the token was made in the name of W. Petersen, not B. Petersen, the researches of the Canterbury Branch of the New Zealand Numismatic Society have determined that this was a mistake in the manufacture of the tokens, as there was no W. Petersen, Watchmaker and Jeweller, in Christchurch in the years up to 1882.

Petersen issued one penny token. The token was struck by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne. The Museum Victoria catalogue gives an estimated date for the issue as circa 1863.





## William Pratt, Draper, Christchurch, New Zealand (1823-?)



During the six years between 1843 and 1849 Pratt was quite a rover, having interests ranging from ship-building, growing potatoes in Tahiti, to farming. In 1848 we find him book-keeping in a general store in Wellington...Hearing the prospects of the new Church of England settlement in Canterbury, he moved to Port Cooper (later called Lyttleton), in 1849. Having arranged first for stocks of goods for a general store, and also for the store itself by having a prefabricated store made in Nelson where timber was cheap... We find his advertisement in the centre of the front page of the Lyttleton Times of Saturday 11 January, 1851, offering a variety of widely assorted goods for sale at the general drapery store and bakehouse, Canterbury Street.

William Pratt was born in 1823 and after his education was apprenticed to the drapery trade. After working in London he migrated to New Zealand and arrived as one of the early settlers of Nelson on 4 February, 1843. After pursuing a range of occupations, including growing potatoes in Tahiti, farming in New Zealand and ship building, he was working as a book keeper in Wellington by 1848. The following year he moved to Lyttleton, Christchurch's port town. He had a prefabricated store made and shipped to him. The first public record that Canterbury numismatists could find of his business was an 1851 advertisement from the Lyttleton Times of 11 January 1851, in which his business was described as a 'general drapery store and bakehouse', located in Canterbury Street.

Pratt left that business in 1854, but after going back to Nelson for 9 years he once again returned to Christchurch and, after some set backs, bought the business at Dunstable House from David Clarkson, whose father Samuel was also a token issuer. Pratt took over ownership of the business in early January 1864.

Pratt was very successful at his new venture, and built a new brick building for the store, as well as a large warehouse. He sold the business to John Ballantyne in 1882, but kept ownership of the premises, in addition to the neighbouring property at the corner of Cashel and Colombo Streets, where Hobday and Jobberns, another token issuing business, had their business.

In addition to his business ventures, Pratt was also twice a member of the Christchurch City Council. His house, in Worcester Street, was still standing in 1950.

The history of the store does not include any further details about Pratt, other than to say that his estate retained ownership of the land mentioned above until the 1940s. Ballantyne's large and prestigious store was still in business in 1950. This source states that the most likely period for the issue of the tokens was between 1864 and 1872. The tokens were struck by W.J. Taylor of London.

Edward Reece was born in Shropshire, England, but left his father's farm to work in Birmingham's hardware trade. He bought stock there and then departed for New Zealand, arriving in Lyttleton in August 1855. He established his business the following year. He was sufficiently successful to open additional stores in Christchurch and Fiji. Reece was a member of the first Christchurch municipal council in 1862. He managed his store until 1879 when he passed the business on to his son, William. He died in 1887.

The company was still trading in 1950, when the Canterbury Branch of the Numismatic Society of New Zealand wrote their history of Reece and his business. The business did not appear to be trading under that name in 2005.

Reece issued three penny and three halfpenny tokens, struck for him by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne. The tokens are undated but the Museum Victoria catalogue gives the date of issue for all six varieties of tokens as circa 1860.

Reece was a founder of the Canterbury Brewing, Malting and Distilling Company. He was also an extensive land owner. He purchased the 8,600 acre Montserrat run-hold in North Canterbury from fellow token issuer, Henry J. Hall, for 26,000 ponds. He also owned land in Kaikoura, as well as smaller farms closer to Christchurch. Edward Reece died on 12 September 1885, aged 51. Edward Reece Ltd traded until 1977. Reference: Humberstoen, Vaughn. MR. EDWARD REECE, Founder of the firm of Edward Reece and Sons, was the son of a Shropshire farmer. After remaining some time on his father's farm, he went to Birmingham, where he acquired a practical knowledge of the hardware business, with a view to a future in the colonies. He had familiarised himself with colonial wants, and selected the new Canterbury settlement as the scene of his enterprise. Mr. Reece purchased a shipment of stock, and left England himself in the ship "Caroline Agnes" for Lyttelton, where he arrived on the 17th of August, 1855. He at once set about preparing the way in Christchurch for the business, which he carried on for many years; not, however, restricting his operations to Canterbury, but conducting large undertakings in other parts of New Zealand and in Fiji. Mr. Reece personally superintended the business till 1879, when he handed over the management to his son, Mr. W. Reece. As a colonist he was highly esteemed, both in his business relations and in private life. Mr. Reece

died in 1887.

Smith fought during the Maori wars and was rewarded with a block of land on Auckland's waterfront at Northcote. In later life he moved to Sydney, where he became a director of the Colonial Mutual Life Insurance Company. He died in Sydney in 1917.

The Museum Victoria catalogue gives an approximate year of issue for his tokens as c.1862. There are six catalogued varieties (and a number that are not held by the Museum but have been described) of Smith's tokens, which were struck for him by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne.

Mark Somerville, Wholesale Grocer, Auckland, New Zealand (circa 1830-1902)



Little is known about Mark Sommerville, who issued a trade token advertising his Wholesale Grocery business in Auckland in 1875. An article, cited by H.A. Robinson from the 6 March 1850 edition of the New Zealander announced the end of his partnership with Robert McCutcheon.

While his date and place of birth are not known, it is certain that his business endured for many years. Robinson describes the corner block where the store was initially located as 'the datum point for most information given to strangers as to suburban distances; "so many miles from Somerville's corner" was the common form of direction.' (Robinson, 1974, p.142). After many years the store moved to another site in Auckland, and soon after he sold it to a Mr Walter Graham. Somerville died in 1902.

Somerville's tokens bear the floral emblems of Ireland, England and Scotland - the shamrock, rose and thistle - and are dated 1857. They were made by Thomas Stokes of Melbourne.



The United Service Hotel was located at the corner of Queen and Wellesley Streets, Auckland. Despite being burned to the ground in a fire that swept through that section of the city in September 1873, the hotel was rebuilt and two penny varieties of tokens were issued from that address in 1874.

In the 1880s H.N. Abbott was the licensee at the address 239-241 Queen Street, and Robinson records that 'It is said that Abbott conducted illegal sweeps or 'consultations' at a time when this was legal, and when made illegal he went to Tasmania.' (Robinson). In 1974, at the time of that research, the building was still trading as a hotel, but its entrance was located on Wellesley Street.

From a reference later in Robinson's article, it seems that another issuer, Morris Marks, had his pawnbroker's business diagonally opposite the United Service Hotel.

The hotel's tokens were struck by an unknown British Mint, according to the Museum Victoria Catalogue.





## James Wallace, Grocer, Wellington, New Zealand (circa 1830-?)





James Wallace first appears in Wellington's records with an entry in the city's 1853 Almanac. A Mr G.P. Wallace, Grocer of Lambton Quay was listed in the 1851 edition, and this could have been his father. According to A.F. Robb, Wallace's shop was the fifth one on the west side of Lambton Quay, and situated on the corner of Bowen Street. His house was on Bolton Street.

In 1855 Wallace was on the Wellington Athenaeum Mechanic's Institute's Committee. He retired in 1876 or 1877, and gathered funds for the Wellington-Manawatu Railway Company. He then became Secretary and General Manager of the company.

The New Zealand Almanac for 1855 included two advertisements for businesses on Lambton Quay run under the name of Wallace. The first was for 'J.H. Wallace, Auctioneer and General Commission Merchant.' The other 'Messrs. G. & J. Wallace [who] respectfully inform their friends and the public, that there will always be at their stores. Lambton Quay, a well-selected stock of Groceries, of first-rate quality, and which will be disposed of at low rates... Orders from the country carefully fulfilled and executed without delay.' Taking the above advertisement in the light of Robb's comments, it seems possible that in 1855 James and his father were starting out in a new business partnership together. The Wellington Electoral Roll for 1855, however, does not include a G. Wallace. However the Roll does include a John Howard Wallace, Merchant, of Boulcott Street, so it seems likely that there were at least two J. Wallaces in Wellington in 1855.

Wallace's tokens were issued in 1859, and they are the only tokens from Wellington to have the date of issue on them. The tokens were made for him in England by W.J. Taylor.

Wilson issued tokens in 1857. They were struck for him by W. J. Taylor of London. In 1863 he sold his business to Messrs. Wilkinson and Dixon.

He is also said to have been one of the first photographers in Dunedin and is credited with having taken the first photograph of the town.

In 1863 Wilson lived in Moray Place, Dunedin, and worked for Reynolds & Co., Aerated water manufacturers. That business closed in 1867. Wilson died on 4 January, 1883 at the age of 57.

In this a master tool, having the full appearance of the final token for the obverse and reverse is manufactured in steel. This is then used to prepare working dies. This technique makes the identification of individual dies from variations in rim bead counts or alignment of lettering impossible. Researchers have noted minor variations in the lowest relief areas of the tokens that may be the result of variations of quality of the die production off the hub (Hey de p. 49) or minor tooling. These are noted in the descriptions but museum storage is based on denomination and date.

Holloway's tokens were struck in such large numbers that the minting technique of hubbing was clearly employed. In this a master tool, having the full appearance of the final token for the obverse and reverse is manufactured in steel. This is then used to prepare working dies. This technique makes the identification of individual dies from variations in rim bead counts or alignment of lettering impossible. Researchers have noted minor variations in the lowest relief areas of the tokens that may be the result of variations of quality of the die production off the hub (Heyde p. 49) or minor tooling. These are noted in the descriptions but museum storage is based on denomination and date.

#### Summary:

#### Health and hy giene.

'Cleanliness is next to Godliness'. This is a difficult maxim to follow when there is not one bath in sixty', when sewerage gathers in cesspits and open drainage channels line the streets. But the residents of Little Lon did practice personal hygiene. Archaeologists have uncovered toothbrushes and toothpaste pots, scent bottles, soap dishes, combs and hairbrushes.

Clean teeth and neat hair did not guarantee good health however. Doctors were expensive, so ordinary people had to rely on medicines like Holloway's Ointment and Hall's Vegetable Pain Conqueror as well as Chinese herbal remedies. Children were dosed weekly with the laxative castor oil, to keep their bowels regular.





The other Messrs. G. & J. Wallace [who] respectfully inform their friends and the public, that there will always be at their stores, Lambton Quay, a well-selected stock of Groceries, of first-rate quality, and which will be disposed of at low rates...Orders from the country carefully fulfilled and executed without delay.'
